Everyone in the new Mahican Chapter was invited to Winter Camp XV, the first Mahican Winter Camp. It was not until a few years later that a few guys from Huron and a couple from Sauk Trail showed up. Since 1991, Downriver and Sauk Trail districts combined into the current Three Rivers district.

After a few more years, youth from all over the chapter have been able to come together for Winter Camp. The cohesiveness of the youth has never been more present that this year at Winter Camp XXVII, with youth leader Zach Polifroni, kitchen guy Mike Hodnicki, and Lodge Pillar Rob Hartwig.

## Back in the Day Rat-a-tat-tat!

Winter Camp had its first computer before Sam Stocker was even qualified to be a tert. In 1978, Mike Osvath's TRS-80 was on the scene at Winter Camp printing rosters, coordinating the Murder Game, and attracting a group of zealous Arrowmen known as the rat-a-tat-tatters.

Twenty-five years ago Mike's computer was a rarity. Although two other Winter Campers had TRS-80s, the rest had rarely used a computer before and certainly had not at home. In today's world of 24-7 high-speed Internet access, it's probably hard to imagine a time when 75% of the people attending Winter Camp had never touched (or possibly even seen) a computer.

This lack of familiarity and the excitement of being able to play computer games led to more than a few disagreements about whose turn it was to play and just who had played the most. A distinct group of campers was born: the rat-a-tat-tatters. The group is named after the sound of the keys being pressed because in those days there was no such thing as a mouse or a joystick (the TRS-80 later had a joystick, but never a mouse). Doing anything on the computer meant typing, even if it was just clicking the arrows to play a game.

The rat-a-tat-tatters were famous for rushing to the machine between activities and for staying up way too late playing with them. Although most of them are no longer Winter Campers, Lou Pezet was once a rat-a-tat-tatter. Many of the others attended quite a few camps including Mike Lowry, Doug Seman (who was once youth leader of camp) and Brad Eakin.

Rat-a-tat-tatting reached its peak at Winter Camp XI when there were 11 computers set up in the "Computer Palace" at Clearwater Cabin.
