# Red Menace Thriving In Winter Camp Universe

In the footsteps of Wisconsin Senator Joseph McCarthy, and in an effort to flush out the Communist-inspired ilk said to be lurking throughout Winter Camp, four teams of investigators set out to determine the extent of the problem on Day Two. The questions were clear, the information was out there, and the mathematical precision that produced the final result could not be contested.

Everyone at Winter Camp became an informant, and was judged on their knowledge of their fellows. The investigative teams were polled on 32 dimensions of information, and were then challenged to devise a mathematical formula to compute the number of Communist sympathizers lurking in the WCU. Data from this survey may be found elsewhere in today's *News*—what the agents provided was their estimate of the extent of the problem. The team led by Will Gagnon produced a guess of 141.6 left-wing radicals, raising the question of what 60% of a Communist really is.

Following the exercise, representatives of three teams joined forces to conclude that the maximum value to be derived from the data available and the mathematical constraints was 35,111 10/13—once again: we wonder what a fractional Communist really means. (Communist only from Monday-Friday? Perhaps.)

### Back In The Day

While last night's game of McCarthyism was somewhat in jest, Winter Camp really did experiment with a Communist government in the 1980's, after an effort to use a patrol system at Winter Camp IV proved somewhat problematic. Winter Camp V, in 1981, saw a central committee of overseers construct a "Five Day Plan" and lay out a collection of jobs to be filled by campers. Winter Camp printed its own currency for the event; campers were paid for work such as washing dishes or preparing meals, but were charged \$100 in WC funds per night for bunk rental. Additional bunk space was made available through an auction. A system of fines for such crimes against the state as missing activities further ensured that Arrowmen would need to put in some work to pay their way through camp. Samples of this currency may be seen in the Winter Camp Museum.

The Communist government persisted through Winter Camp VII in its original form, but was modified for Winter Camp VIII. Supreme authority was vested in the Korish, who oversaw a team of three Primary Centrics. These high-level administrators directed their own Secondary Centrics (Arrowmen able to conduct normal respiratory activities), who further led the Tertiary Centrics, or "Terts"—who had to have successfully completed birth. Hovering in the shadows and pulling all of the Korish's strings was the three-man Inner World Society.

The Communist economic system was compromised by "old money", so the WC dollar was revalued for Winter Camp VIII. While the bills were quietly retired at weekette's end, they have been brought out once or twice since for other Winter Camp events.
