Gastronomic Delights

The term "Bronto Burgers" on today's menu may raise expectations that are destined to be dashed. One of the more unusual listings under "Traditions" in the Winter Camp Manual is "No hamburgers on menu". They were served at Winter Camp I, but have not made an actual appearance at camp since. A trend which seems to have arisen accidentally in the early years of Winter Camp, it was during revision of the Manual for Winter Camp IX that this omission was noticed and attention first paid to its successful continuation.
