The second game of 4-Way Volleyball is traditionally played by teams organized by Scout ranks. Winter Camp this year is uncharacteristically short on Eagle Scouts with multiple palms, so two palm-deficient Eagles from before 1983 were assigned to the Eagles with Palms team. At the other end of the advancement ladder, several Life Scouts with fewer than 30 merit badges pitched in for the First Class and Star Scout team. Those two teams were the last ones standing, but the Old Eagles team rode the Rand Rocket—a stunningly effective service technique developed by Winter Camp pioneer Jeff Rand—to a 5-15-15-15 victory in the day's final battle.

Gastronomic Delights

The first full day of Winter Camp XXXV will kick off with the **Continental Breakfast** for early risers. This is the most commonly-served meal theme through the first 34 Winter Camps, and was inspired by Doug Wilson's observation in 1990 that he never woke up hungry at Winter Camp.

The **Irish Lunch** is a relative newcomer to the world of Winter Camp meal themes. Corned beef debuted as a dinner—the Irish Feast—at Winter Camp XXVI before reappearing the next year as a lunch.

The **Synchronized Supper** was first served at Winter Camp IX in 1985. Campers that year learned of Activities Director Matt Mittino's fondness for peas and carrots, as he frequently directed all eaters to aim their forks in that direction. Will this year's meal leader have a similar predilection? Time will tell.

The **Pac-Man Snack** made its first appearance at Winter Camp XXII on Tron Day, and it's somewhat surprising that it took so long to return. We shall travel back to the world of the classic 1980's video game—and this is why the shopping list for camp called for 200 feet of string.

Alimentary Endings

"It tastes better than it smells" was Winter Camp adviser Steve Donohue's assessment of the sloppy joes served at yesterday's **Blind Lunch**. Judging from the quantity of food consumed by campers—even though they couldn't see what they were eating—everyone pretty much agreed.

Winter Camp is trying a new kitchen experiment this weekette, with several meals to be prepared entirely by youth. On the day after Thanksgiving, a slightly larger crew gathered, again in Allen Park, to check on the progress made to date and decide on the final details of camp. Good and bad ideas are discussed and fairly voted upon. At this meeting, the five youth members in attendance held 20 votes among them, while the seven adults only had 14 votes altogether. All of the events and meal themes for camp were settled at this meeting. It follows, therefore, that if you're not happy with the events and meal themes selected for this year, you should take your complaints to the youth members who held the real power at the November meeting.
